The 24th June 2016 is a day most of us will well remember, as it was when the “Referendum” vote result was announced... But for my beautiful wife, Jenny, and myself, it was the day that we were told by our doctor, following various hospital tests, that Jenny had terminal pancreatic cancer. So a terrible - totally life changing - day for both of us, which I will never forget. Particularly as we had enjoyed a wonderfully happy marriage of over 46 years, travelled extensively and thought we were both pretty fit, eating the “right” food and doing regular exercise. But life can be so cruel...

Subsequently, before Jenny got very ill, she asked me to promise that I try to do two things for her. One, that she would die at home in Honington, with me by her side, and two, that she would not die in agony. I was determined to keep my promise, but not sure if I could do it. But thanks to Shipston Home Nurses, Jenny's last wishes were fully met.



The terrible truth about pancreatic cancer is that by the time it is diagnosed it is too late for any real survival treatment. We were offered chemotherapy, but it is very painful and it would only have given Jenny (if lucky) an extra four weeks on her life. It is a deadly disease with a 97% death rate.

Jenny still managed to swim until late June, but her health was very quickly deteriorating. She was amazingly brave, never ever complained and was resigned to her dire situation. We managed to cope during July, but I obviously needed professional nursing support. On the 26th of July we met with our first SHN nurse, who quickly helped sort things out, arranging daily calls from both the SHN and NHS District Nurses, the delivery of a hospital bed, the issue of the correct drugs (mainly morphine), regular personal care (very important for morale) and the (vital) night nurse support.

From my experience, a pancreatic cancer patient seems to go through three stages. Firstly - not too bad and just coping; Secondly - still mobile, but perhaps hallucinating and

getting more ill by the day; Thirdly - cancer has spread to the liver, so jaundiced, bed-bound and terminally ill. In some ways, I found the second stage the toughest and I will always be grateful to my three SHN regular “bank” night nurses, namely, Tracey, Mary Rose and Francis. They helped me get a good night's sleep and were so kind and caring. I will

never forget them. Also, Caroline, Donna and Barbara (SHN) and all the NHS District Nurses, led by the lovely and so caring, Carolyn. Also, to my daughter, Elizabeth, who with three children under eight, never left my side during the last weeks.

As it was the height of summer, many nurses were on holiday, which resulted in seeing many different faces. I kept a record, and over 20 different nurses came to care for Jenny, in less than two months. Shipston Home Nurses did a truly wonderful job and a SHN nurse was by my side when Jenny passed away peacefully, in our bedroom on 17th September, at 7:15pm in the evening.

SHN do a wonderful job and I don't know how you all do it! I think it is down to a dedicated desire to lovingly care for terminally ill people, from all walks of life.

I asked family, friends and neighbours to make donations, in memory of my lovely Jenny, to SHN. So far we have raised over £1,400. We are so fortunate to have you here and I cannot thank everyone involved enough! Bless you all.

The Nursing report Janet Oakey

2017 marks not only Shipston Home Nursing's 20th anniversary but also the 50th anniversary of St. Christopher's Hospice and the modern hospice movement founded by Dame Cicely Saunders.

Dame Cicely's forward thinking approach to the end of life care has enabled those involved in caring for terminally ill patients to adopt a holistic approach, caring for a patient's physical, social, spiritual and psychological wellbeing.

St. Christopher's set out to discover practical solutions to alleviate patients' symptoms, sharing their discoveries with other medical professionals. Dame Cicely openly encouraged education and research not only in the care of the dying but for the practice of medicine as a whole.

In October 1969, Cicely Saunders was prompted to start hospice care at home

and together with Barbara McNulty, a nurse, and Dr Mary Baines, she pioneered the first home care service for terminally ill patients. Her vision for modern day hospice care has enabled organisations like Shipston Home Nursing to provide expert palliative nursing for terminally ill people delivered at home by dedicated health care professionals. It is her belief that everyone matters, regardless of who you are or where you come from that drives us forward today.

A Letter from Harold J. Porter

The peaceful retirement world of my wife Sheila and I had prevailed in the village of Kineton for 26 years. It suddenly changed and came hard up against the buffers in August last year when we were told the cancerous growth that had been dormant in Sheila for many months had suddenly flared up, and had gone to her brain. This would not respond to treatment and was terminal. I would lose Sheila in a matter of a few weeks.

I was asked: did I wish for her to be taken to a Hospice or to her own home. After a quick discussion with my daughter, we did not hesitate: to remain in her own home.

The arrangements made by the NHS for my wife to come home were quickly put in place. The District Nurses took charge. Arrangements were made and Carers to come in four times a day to attend to Sheila's personal needs and I was asked "would I like the Nurses from Shipston Home Nursing to attend as necessary to take the strain off my shoulders"? They would increase the Nursing of Sheila each day as her life ebbed away.

I was out of my depth. I knew of Shipston Home Nursing and knew they covered Kineton but no more. I said the biggest "Yes please" of my life!

As Sheila became more confined to her bed and lost physical aptitude, they increasingly took over. Giving her drinks, keeping her clean, moving her to prevent bed sores, keeping



her mind at peace and eventually staying all night at her bedside insisting that I go to bed and get a good night's sleep. During the day they attended regularly and when not there, I had a telephone number to call which brought them back to Sheila's bedside in ten or fifteen minutes.

Was it the right decision to have Sheila home to die?

Oh yes.

Did she lack any medical or nursing support?

No.

Was her passing from this world peaceful?

Very.... and all thanks in very large measure to Shipston Home Nursing

And the cost of all that wonderful support?

Not a penny!

To all at Shipston Home Nursing...

Many thanks. And may you continue to get the financial support to keep you giving palliative care back to the community of Kineton and the surrounding area.




20 Walks in Shipston Country



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Chairman's report Clive Irwin

Shipston Home Nursing has had its own challenges over the past year or so and we can only look forward to the New Year with renewed optimism and enthusiasm.

I refer you to the annual report, which has now been published on our website, for further details of what the Charity has achieved and been up to this year.

The newly instituted Management Committee of 4 Trustees has had a major role in reviewing the structure and function of the service and worked hard to prepare for applying for CIO status which will dovetail conveniently into a CQC inspection visit in 2017. This type of visit checks quality and delivery of care and can be a challenge but is also a chance to demonstrate the good work the Nurses deliver.

A Responsible Officer has been appointed to assure quality and standards.

The aim of the Charity is to increase nursing activity including night sits and this is



now available and happening. We may also expand our referral base by taking earlier referrals, and additional types of patients after a trial period working with the Shipston Medical Centre.

For the Charity to function well, we need appropriate nursing capacity and regular referrals from both hospital and community teams.

The liaison with the District Nursing team has been much improved by the proximity

afforded by our tenancy of office accommodation in Ellen Badger Hospital.

I was very disappointed to receive a complaint about lack of access to the service at a very difficult time and we have worked hard to address the concerns raised - this was not about the standard of care delivered but the referral process which failed this patient and their Carers.

2017 is the 20th Anniversary of the inception of the Charity and there will be a celebratory Ball in September 2017.

The prime aim of the Charity remains care and comfort of those patients with a terminal illness who wish to remain at home, close to family and friends.

3 Trustees and a Canoe

The expedition is about the 'Circle of Life'. The money raised will help SHN, where end of life care is paramount, and Ethan, to whom we can give the chance of a real life.



Once upon a time, in a consulting room near you, there were two Trustees of Shipston Home Nursing having a conversation about fundraising for SHN and Ethan Suglo. Jeremy Wiggin had always had an ambition to navigate the entire length of the 'Mighty River Stour'. As Dr David Williams extracted the needle from his knee joint, the contract was sealed and the adventure began.

After an extensive skill mix analysis a fellow Trustee Simon Miesegaes was approached due to his logistical and navigational skills and the team was launched. Also required was a person who had local knowledge and spoke many of the local dialects of the villages - Ian McConnel proved to be the perfect gentleman and well known by all the landowners who we would have to ask permission to make this expedition possible.

A photographic shoot by the local media was planned on the Mighty Stour - afterwards it was pointed out that the three brave explorers were in fact facing backwards in the canoe!

An adventure of this seriousness and magnitude needed planning with care and precision.

Simon and Ian did reconnaissance and mapped uncharted territory, meanwhile David studied tropical diseases and Jeremy went on holiday!

Reality dawned 4:42am on Monday 27th June when Ian



Ethan was a three-year-old Ghanaian boy who needed life-saving abdominal surgery. David had met him in Ghana the previous year whilst visiting his daughter who was doing volunteer work in Akatsi, Ghana. David tried to arrange surgery in Africa but this proved impossible so the John Radcliffe Hospital kindly agreed to carry out the surgery if £30,000 could be raised to pay for it.





dropped the three fearless adventurers at the mighty source of the Stour at Wigginton Heath, trying not to wake up the Taylor family!

Our route took us across the Sibford - Hook Norton roads and on to Traitor's Ford. We then made steady progress until our next stopping point, the Cherington Arms which unfortunately was not open to quench our thirst at 10am. From the Cherington Arms we walked on towards the A3400 and into Shipston where we were met by a wonderful crowd on Mill Bridge - some of whom were hoping to witness a capsize as we transferred from foot to canoe. However, all went smoothly until Charles Suglo (Ethan's father), who was accompanying David, decided to attach a 47kg empty gas canister, found floating in the river,

to the canoe. David, unaware of this, was all set to moor in order to carry the canoe down the Weir at the back of Fell Mill when the canister decided to take on the Weir, dragging the canoes behind. No capsize and all were safe but a warning to us all! Exhausted and in need of substance we made land at Honington Hall and received a warm welcome from the natives who brought food and water and were very welcoming. Jeremy was tucking into a well- earned sandwich





Day 2 - another early start and David was joined by Will Dockar-Drysdale in his canoe, rather than Charles. We made good progress due to favourable weather conditions and with increasing confidence we shot over several rapids and weirs. Passing through Alscot Park and with a storm forecast for the afternoon we headed towards Clifford Chambers and arrived at the mouth of the Stour with cheering cows and crowds! The data which we will submit to the Geographical Society shows the entire journey to be 27 miles, 11 walked and 16 canoed! The success of the expedition was celebrated and toasted thanks to Emma Holman-West and the hospitality of fizz and food by the Bell at Alderminster.

when Ethan shouted "Obolo" at him. Jeremy's chest puffed out thinking that it meant 'Great Warrior' but it was lost in translation, as it meant 'fat one'!

Behind schedule because of numerous hazards and challenges we were grateful for a warm welcome by a patient crowd at Halford Bridge. As we approached Ettington Park we heard gunfire and assuming unfriendly natives were lurking in wait, Ian McConnel was sent to negotiate a safe passage through. Having established there was a Clay Pigeon Shoot at Ettington Park we succeeded in arriving safely at our overnight stop, Talton Mill Scout Hut. The Bell at Alderminster was our watering hole, the local cider was great medicine, and one team member slightly overdosed (the navigator)!

The completion of this magnificent expedition by these three brave adventurers was only made possible due to the generosity of our sponsors: Strutt and Parker, Technique Print Group and The Bell at Alderminster. It would also not have been possible without the wonderful support of the farmers and landowners who allowed us to cross their land at a time when crops were growing fast and thoughts were turning towards harvesting. We simply could not have done it without them.

At Shipston Home Nursing, our wonderful nursing team provide respite, expertise and, frankly, someone to talk to and rely on - all at a time, when patients are close to the end of their lives. Ethan's story was about giving a



chance to someone who perhaps would only reach the age of seven or eight years without expert medical help. For the four of us, the wonderful donations we received (in excess of £23,000) allowed us to help someone at the start of their Circle of Life as well as those for whom the Circle of Life is closing. That was a truly humbling experience and we cannot thank all of those who donated, in whatever forms, for their support. The Spirit of those whom we have lost is perhaps seen in Ethan's new chance of a long and healthy life.

A final thanks go to our amazing support team Ian, Rebecca, Debbie, Nikki, Jacquie and Mark Holberton Talton Mill, who prepared the reeds on the Stour for our safe passage.



Cath Daley's Marathon

After months of hard training, the morning of Sunday 24th April 2016 arrived, London Marathon Day. Oh dear what have I done? My first attempt at the London Marathon. I'd had a good night's sleep. My running kit was laid out the night before with the race number pinned to my vest emblazoned with my main sponsor Blink Medical. This event was all about raising as much money for SHN in memory of Andy Bygate a dear friend who lost his battle to a brain tumour. In a last bid to raise more funds that morning I pledged people to donate £5.64 as it was 564 days since he had passed away. I knew Andy would be with me every step of the way.



Back to the room to get ready and read my many messages of support from family, friends and colleagues. By goodbyes; first to my biggest fan my husband Steve and then across the hotel corridor to say an emotional goodbye to Andy's wife Sharon and his beautiful children Charlie Izzy and George. They were still sleeping but wanted to wave me off and wish me luck. I had to be focused, there would be plenty of time for the tears and laughter later. They had been briefed on the best viewing points around the course and I had a vague idea where I would hopefully see them on the course.

The tubes and trains were packed but excellently managed as the atmosphere built. In the park there were people all shapes, sizes and ages. People were stretching, limbering up and making last minute kit adjustments. My goal time was under 5 hours.

I arrived in my starting pen 45 minutes before the start. I listened to people chatting between themselves, one man said the most he had run was 4 miles.... I couldn't believe it! This filled me with confidence as my longest run had been 21 miles albeit a slow plod.

The start was loudly counted down with a big cheer. The first few miles were not as

congested as I thought and I was soon into a comfortable stride. My mantra was not to start too quickly, but it is difficult to not get carried away with the emotion of the day and up the pace with the surge of adrenaline.

Seeing the Cutty Sark was a lasting memory I had from watching the London marathon as a child, now I was running around it. Next was Tower Bridge an adrenaline rush and the half way marker. I felt pretty good at the halfway mark. I was desperate to see my family and friends. I received a call they were struggling to get through the crowds.

On route I received phone calls from Australia, Germany, Liverpool and Warrington, all with words of encouragement to keep me going. After speaking with my parents over in Oz I had a little blub.

Mile 24 Embankment - my team of supporters were there. A quick high five, I had waited so long to see them. I thought the last 2 miles would now be a breeze but how wrong I was, I checked my watch I thought I would easily get under my 5 hour target. After seeing my supporters there was time for another blub,



not something you practice on your training runs. This was my hitting the wall moment. For the first time I had a wave of negativity. I'm hurting, I'm emotional, I'm tired, I need to walk. This shouldn't be happening now, I should be enjoying the last 2 miles. I was constantly thinking of why I am doing this, Andy Bygate! I can do this I've done the hardest bit, dig deep, I've not walked once why do it at mile 24? I looked at my watch and thought where's those minutes gone I might struggle to make the 5 hour target. I now upped the pace, 800m to go, I thought that's twice round an athletics track. Perhaps I upped the pace too much as my breathing laboured on reaching 400m and I really could feel for the first time the lactic acid building in my legs.



But before I knew I was about to enter what I had visualised on all those training runs I turned out of Birdcage Walk and there was Buckingham Palace in all its glory. The home stretch, take this moment in, I've got to sprint down the Mall like a professional with arms aloft as I cross the line. Let the celebrations commence!

Running the London Marathon is probably the closest a non-professional athlete could feel like being a professional. The spectators make

this event. As I sit here writing this I can feel myself welling up with emotion of pride at crossing that finish line and the reason why I did it. An unbelievable, unforgettable experience:- proud to be one in a million.

I would like to thank Shipston Home Nursing in allowing me to represent their Charity, this was the first year SHN had applied for a London

Marathon place. Sharon, Charlie, Izzy and George Bygate for the tears, laughter and amazing support you gave me. Roger and Charlotte Tyler for their amazing sponsorship and support. Sue Peters my marathon training buddy who spurred me on each mile. And last, my biggest supporter of all, my husband Steve who gave me the time, patience and kept me focused on my end goal.

And let's not forget the reason I was there in the first place to raise money for Shipston Home Nursing in memory of an amazing charismatic man and a true friend Andy Bygate.

Our enormous thanks to Cath and her team who raised an incredible £5701. Also received, were donations from The British Transport Police Federation (£300) and British Transport Police Sports and Social Club (£75). Enormous thanks to Blink Medical, Roger and Charlotte Tyler who sponsored Cath £2,500.

Treasurer's report Christopher Owen

We are now in our twentieth year of providing free nursing for the terminally ill at home in the Wellesbourne, Kineton and Shipston on Stour areas in South Warwickshire.

We managed to cover our costs for the financial year ended 30 June 2016, and made a surplus of £99,335.

We received £60,328 mainly from NHS Primary Health Care Trusts for the continuing care by our nurses of NHS patients leaving hospital and referred to SHN. If we had not received a record £217,500 in legacies a loss of £118,165 would have been suffered.

Fundraising events contributed £73,163 after event costs. We have adequate reserves to cover operating costs invested in COIF Charity Funds managed by CCLA Investment Managers Ltd.

We need at least £300,000 this financial year to 30 June 2017 to cover our outgoings.

Developments

Our fundraising team continue to attract support from businesses in



the area and welcome any leads in this respect.

We have leased dedicated office premises as an administrative base for use by an administrator and for nurses to meet, close to the District Nursing team in the Ellen Badger Hospital.

A continuing service review is being undertaken by the Trustees management team to strengthen the nursing base, improve training and expanding the service to patients.

Conversion to a charitable incorporated organisation (CIO) is ongoing.

The dedicated experienced professional team of Trustees, Nurses and Fundraisers are continuing working hard to ensure the longer term success of the service.

I would urge supporters of Shipston Home Nursing to consider making provision in their wills in favour of the charity and life time gifts of shares, property etc, and if assistance is needed I am on hand for guidance.

Keep up the good work and thanks for your support and your continuing efforts.


