EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT Andrew Revell

Welcome to our 2021 newsletter.



Early 2020 brought the news that Asia was experiencing the early stages of the COVID -19 pandemic. It was all too easy to think China is a long way away, we have heard it all before with SARS, which did not really affect us here in the UK, so we will be fine.

How wrong was !!

By early March we were fully immersed in developing new protocols, procedures for safe working and increasing our collaboration with NHS Trusts, Sister Charities, and other healthcare partners. Preparing for something you have never experienced, cannot physically see, which often does not manifest itself with identifiable symptoms and can be transmitted by air, fluid and touch is not easy. Best practice and guidance were changing daily, we followed

the evolving advice from Public Health England and tried to glean as much information and guidance from the many Zoom and Teams meetings we were now being requested to attend daily.

The fundamentals of everything we did was to maximise the protection of our staff and patients. We invested in and started using the best quality Person Protective Equipment (PPE) we could source with the view that being overcautious was the only approach to take to keep everybody safe.

Apart from the first two weeks after the March lockdown where we tried to restrict visiting patients' homes to hands-on nursing and symptom control only, our nursing service has operated as normal, albeit with strict risk assessments and lots of PPE. This is truly a testament

to the quality of our staff ably guided by Gemma Roberts our Head of Nursing.

During the 2020 calendar year we cared for a total of 162 patients, we fully expected an influx of patients, largely from Hospital discharges, but this did not really happen. What we saw instead, was an increase in the numbers of patients who were now understandably reluctant to enter Hospitals, Hospices and Care Homes and very much chose to spend their final days at home.

Obviously, all community fundraising events were initially cancelled or deferred including our Circus Ball for which a huge amount of planning and organising had been done by the Ball Committee and which was to be the highlight of our fundraising calendar.

Despite the loss of income suffered through not being able to stage events we have been humbled by the incredible generosity of our donors, and supporters during the year. With very few opportunities to stage socially distanced fundraising events our income has been relatively stable through a combination of increases in regular monthly giving, one off donations, legacies, and support from existing and new Trust funds. We also received some grant income from the COVID-19 fund set up by the Government.

Total income for the period ending 30 June 2020 was £372,856, expenditure was £342,309 leaving a net contribution of £24,248. Our Reserves continue to be invested through CCLA Investment Management Ltd, the

income from which contributed £29,387 to overall income.

The optimisation of our Fundraising Department was completed in January 2021, the reduction in fixed costs will start to be evident in our 2020-21 Report and Accounts, with annual benefits being seen thereafter.

Our operational continuity plans have survived and continue to survive the COVID test with all non-clinical staff returning to home working since lockdown number two. Although this works effectively by leveraging technology, we are mindful of the wellbeing of all staff during this difficult period and have the necessary support structures in place to identify and manage this.

Moving forward we continue to find ways of delivering our vision of "ensuring that every adult in our community has access to free high quality end of life care at home" while ensuring that has the financial sustainability to deliver this and more.

I firmly believe that the true measure of an organisation is the way in which its people react during a crisis and my thanks go to all staff and Trustees for their unflinching and ongoing support during this period.

Finally, my personal thanks go to you, our supporters, volunteers, and sponsors, for helping us continue to navigate our way through these ever changing times.

The year has been immensely difficult for everyone and although we have had to adapt our services to protect patients, our community, and our staff, SHN continues to grow. Our patient numbers have increased and the care we provide continually develops.

Our already highly skilled nurses constantly strive to enhance their skills and increase the level of care provided. In fact, during this period staff have gained extra skills to equip them with this constantly changing environment. The nursing team have adapted to the changes forced on our services by the pandemic and have grown the service despite this. I am immensely proud to be part of such an amazing team.

We are incredibly lucky to have the support of our local community but also of the wider healthcare network who have all joined forces to tackle this pandemic. SHN work closely with SWFT, GP's and other hospice services to ensure patients receive the right care at the right time, this wider palliative care network has grown from strength to strength throughout the pandemic to ensure patient care is in no way compromised.

I must add that without the support of our community and fundraising team none of this would be possible, we could not have imagined the generosity of our community and supporters over the last 12 months. I would like to thank everyone who



supports SHN as together we have created a service that supports everyone in our community and gives people choice at the end of their lives.

I am personally proud of the way the whole team have responded. We all owe them an enormous debt of gratitude for working under enormous pressure with such calmness and professionalism.

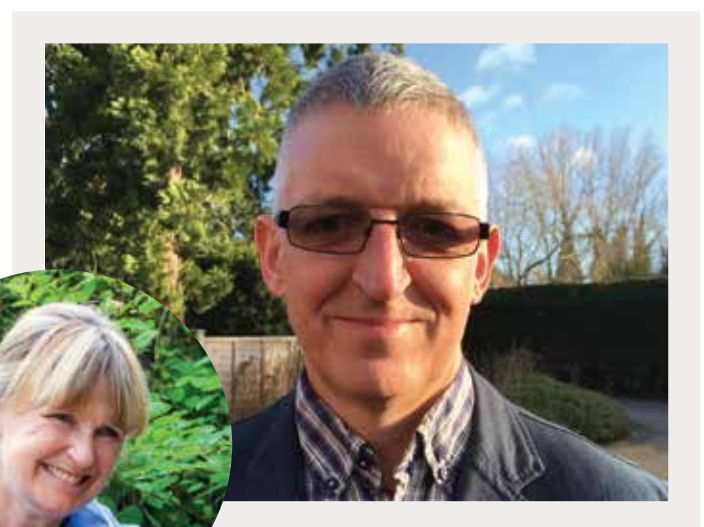
Most patients referred to us before Christmas actually did die in their own homes, avoiding the awful situation of being in a hospital or nursing home with no or very limited visiting. Referrals have quietened down after New Year, perhaps due to the huge numbers of Covid admissions to hospitals, and the disruption to other care pathways in the secondary care system.

Please be assured the team are ready to respond if and when referrals are received.

Other functions of the Charity have taken on a 'remote' flavour, and Fundraising events have quite rightly ceased for now. However, due to a combination of Government support and humbling local generosity, the current finances are stable.

Meetings are now virtual, however the care delivered by the nurses and supporting team is still very real, and will continued to be delivered at a personal level at home as long as staffing and rules allow us to do so.

After 23 years of tireless service, Charlie Wells our founding Trustee decided to retire. Following a personal tragedy where Charlie lost her sister Penny, and identified the need for a Hospice at Home nursing service, she inspired a group of local people to form a Board of Trustees and



Shipston Home Nursing was born. Since that time Charlie has been actively involved with the charity providing clinical guidance and mentorship to the Nursing Team together with a 'can do' approach to the running of the charity. Charlie leaves with our thanks for helping to build our service and reputation to what it is today, we wish her the very best for the future.

In addition Jeremy Wiggan and Simon Miesegaes, both long standing Trustees decided not to stand for re-election because of other commitments, they also leave with our grateful thanks for all their efforts and support over their many years of service.

PEGGY RUTHERFORD

FEBRUARY 4TH, 1921 - NOVEMBER 18TH 2020

Peggy would have been 100 years old on Thursday, February 4th, 2021 and had lived in Shipston with me, her eldest daughter Josie for seven years. We moved here from Sidmouth in Devon to be nearer to my sister Vicki who lives in Sutton Coldfield.

Mum was one of the original 'Wags' and the Victoria Beckham of her day, as in 1946 she married Joe Rutherford, the Aston Villa goalkeeper, and settled in Castle Bromwich, moving from her hometown of Sutton-in-Ashfield in Nottingham. Of course, life wasn't quite as glamorous as it is now for footballers and their wives, as a footballer's wage was £10.00 a week, with a ten shillings bonus for a win on Saturday!

During the war, Mum worked as a Land Girl, and left her job in a silk-stocking factory in Nottingham, to live and work on a farm in Tuxford, Lincolnshire, where she rode on her shire horse pulling a plough, drove the tractor to market, and harvested the produce to feed the population during the years of rationing.

Mum lived with me for almost 20 years after Joe died, moving from my house in Godalming, Surrey, to Sidmouth in Devon and then to Shipston-on-Stour. Mum enjoyed meals out at the local pubs, and cafes, going shopping in Stratford, and reading her kindle, getting through two or three books each month. In 2018 she suffered a stroke, which knocked her off her feet for a short while. However, she recovered well, was soon walking up and down stairs again and doing her own cooking and household chores. In April 2020 she fell at home and broke her hip and went into hospital for the very first time in her life, where she was operated on successfully and came back home in good spirits and pain free. She had help with her personal needs from NHS Home First, and then Shipston Care, who were both wonderful. Unfortunately, in August she contracted a bladder infection, which spread to other areas. She rallied from these and was doing reasonably well and remaining cheerful until the infections resurfaced and she could not fight them off.

At that point Shipston Home Nursing came to the rescue at my request, as it became clear that Mum was unlikely to recover from this second bout of infection and needed more frequent medically focused care. The Nurses from Shipston Home Nursing were an absolute godsend, treating her with respect, kindness, professionalism and compassion. The fact that they were qualified to give medication when required was a great comfort to myself and my sister Vicki, as by this time, although not in any pain, she was suffering from acute anxiety and agitation, which we found particularly distressing to experience and to deal with. Having the

Nurses there was such a blessed comfort and a relief. In Mum's final week, a Nurse came in to fit Peggy with a driver to administer a more regular dose of sedative, and this was done at a moment's notice with no distress to Peggy at all, giving her a more relaxed

and peaceful existence in her last days. The comfort this brought to Mum and to myself and my sister was wonderful.

On the night of the 17th November, Nurse Pat came to stay overnight with us, as Vicki and myself were getting no sleep listening out for Mum all night. Pat was such a comfort, sitting with Mum and checking on her every few minutes. At 6.15am in the morning there was a knock on the bedroom door to let us know that Mum had breathed her last. We went downstairs and Pat respectfully retired to another room so we could spend time with our Mum. Pat came back into the room and asked if we would like her to open the door to let Mum's spirit out. Mum came from a family background where this was always done, so we readily agreed and Pat opened the door for us and we both went outside into the star-filled night and said our goodbyes. After attending to the official proceedings, Pat then stayed with us way beyond her allocated time. She asked if we would like her to go through what needed to be done next, and we agreed. She explained everything clearly with compassion and clarity, and this made the following few days so much easier for us, as we had a clear plan of the way forward. I can't express enough my profound thanks to Shipston Home Nursing and their wonderful service. The booklets and literature they supply prepare you well for the death of a loved one, by explaining what to expect. They work very closely with all the local services; the Medical Centre, Shipston Care, District Nurses, Rapid Response and the NHS generally. I feel so grateful that they are here in the town for all of us, and in particular for the support they gave to me and my sister. I would ask everyone to support this caring organisation in whatever way they can.

I always remember Rebecca asking me to "help" with the sales of the books. When I enquired what it involved, she cleverly said...

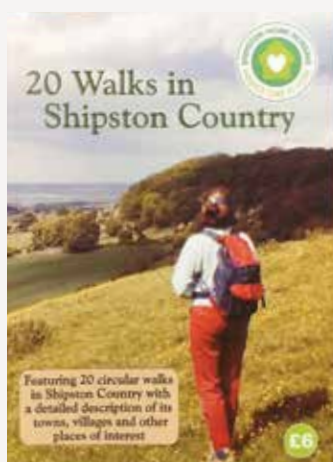

Working with Shipston Nursing & Pharmacy To My Door



In common with so many events, the plan to row from Oxford to London to raise funds for SHN was cancelled last year for the obvious reasons - such a shame as the weather was glorious.

Now, after carefully reviewing the latest Government plans and advice, it looks likely that we will be able to safely run this event this year, albeit with a few changes. For example, whereas the crew had been looking forward to the odd night in a Thames-side hostelry, the crew are now looking forward (ish) to sleeping on the boat and in a tent and even cooking their own food! This self-sufficient approach, with the march of the vaccine programme and the latest Government plans gives us confidence that 2021 will be the year.

The basics remain the same, following the journey of Jerome K Jerome's famous book (David Williams, Jonathan Davies, William Drysdale) will be starting at Donnington Bridge in Oxford on Monday 24th May, we will be rowing the 85 or so miles to London, aiming to arrive at Walton-on-Thames on Saturday 29th May. One of the few up-sides of the last year is that certain crew members have lost a bit of weight and got a bit fitter!

Taking an original Thames camping skiff our plan will take us from Oxford via Radley, Abingdon, Clifton Hampden, Wallingford, Moulsoford, Pangbourne, Reading, Shiplake, Henley, Marlow, Maidenhead, Windsor, Staines, Weybridge and Walton-on-Thames - with our aim being to "camp" aboard.

Amazingly we have managed to secure a commitment from a private benefactor who has generously agreed to double whatever we raise before June 1st, up to a maximum of £10,000. The good news is we've already raised over £3,450, so please give whatever you can. Finally, we hope to set up a web-cam on the boat so you can keep track of the progress - more details on this nearer the time.

ANGELA'S STORY

Angela Balfour-Kinnear, and her three daughters, moved to Shipston in 1977 to open the Walrus toy shop. Angela was always buzzing with energy and ideas. She had never worked in retail before, and considering this, the five marvellous and magical rooms she created, and the knowledge she had of everything in them, was a remarkable accomplishment.

Over the following 21 years Walrus became a place where two generations made lifelong memories, and often a lifelong friend in Angela. She always took a genuine interest in people and their lives, she was perceptive, kind, and hugely generous with her time and love.

In 1997 a magnificent balloon race was launched from the Walrus, to signify the beginning of Shipston Home Nursing, and from that moment on, Angela continued to support and fundraise for SHN, until last year. She could be seen selling at the plant sales (and buying!) every year, baking fabulous cakes for the designer sales, packing bags at Sainsbury's, and selling her beautiful toys and nightdresses at the Christmas fairs. She loved to be involved, and understood what an incredibly important service SHN offers to our community.

Sadly, in September 2020, Angela suffered a heart attack which led to complications. She was hospitalised, and in her last days the wonderful SHN team worked very hard to bring her home. They arranged a special bed for her at very short notice, and communicated with the hospital and other health teams to make what seemed impossible, possible. She was so happy to be home. She was not only able to see her family, her cat and her garden again, but she felt safe, cared for, and comfortable. Precious gifts indeed!

It is with deepest, deepest gratitude, from all of Angela's family to the amazing Shipston Home Nursing nurses for making these miracles happen. Thank you.

Richard Gray is a valued supporter of Shipston Home Nursing and this Summer generously made a virtue of the social restrictions we're enduring to deliver a unique and magical experience to families and friends.

When COVID struck, back in March, my first instinct was to cancel the annual Butterfly Walk at Blackberry Farm, together with all other Stour Valley Wildlife Action Group (SVWAG) activities. However, the more I thought about it, the more I realized there was an opportunity to turn adversity into opportunity. Instead of having a single event and trying to attract as many folk as possible on a single day, it made more sense to go for as many people as possible in a single month. It quickly became apparent that, by having individual appointments (up to 6 people) with two hour slots, that visitors could have 20 acres of open space all to themselves, without the risk of bumping into the visitors in front, or being caught up by those behind. Thus the whole of July was available – and the result turned into the remarkable:

- 400 visitors
- the youngest, six months old
- the oldest, 86 years old
- over £2,000 raised (£5 adult, children free)

As before, the walk (approximately one and a quarter miles) was on a mown circuit with wooden animal sculptures and metal



facsimiles dotted around at suitable points. Additionally, a competition for children to count up the number of exhibits and, if they got the count correct, unfettered access to a generous bowl of chocolates and the scene was set to have a 'jolly good time'! Henry, aged seven, saw a White Letter Hairstreak AND a Hummingbird Hawk Moth: "It's like being in heaven", he said, shaking with excitement. 11-year-old Summer got the sculpture count spot on (22) and won her chocolate reward. The butterflies, for their part, put on a magnificent show with Marbled Whites, Meadow Browns, Ringlets and Gatekeepers out in force with Small Tortoiseshells, Peacocks, Brimstones and Commas adding their support plus, of course, Henry's White Letter Hairstreak.

Thank you to all who came and here's looking forward to next year's events. My enormous thanks to Richard for running this wonderful opportunity for anyone to visit this haven in the countryside. Blackberry Farm is unique and peaceful, all that one wishes for during these troubled times.

HILARY'S STORY

Rebecca asked me why I decided to walk the Virtual Marathon; I did ask myself, on that wet, blustery morning the same question!

A casual post on my fitness group outlining the basis of the London Virtual Marathon and asking for volunteers, got me thinking, maybe I could achieve that, never ever have I run a marathon. I like a challenge (or so I thought) so after asking a few friends if they'd like to join me, I duly went to register. First hurdle failed....all 45,000 places had been filled (limited by the number of medals made) so then I thought what's to stop us tracking our own route and raise some money for SHN, a charity dear to me. I have been involved in a small way over many years and like to support local charities that make such a difference to our community.

A team was formed Malcolm (my husband) sister Deb Slatter and Emma Speechley. Emma, had an official number having applied to run the Marathon in London 2 years previously, and didn't want to now complete it alone as only elite runners were allowed to head to London. I decided on the flattest, nearest route

I could think of, being Long Marston along the Greenway to Stratford-on-Avon, pick up the canal towards Wilmcote and beyond, turn round when we reach 13.1 miles, easy peasy I thought!

Training coincided with the extra walking most people were doing, with the start of lockdown, doing several walks from the Shipston Home Nursing walk book. Emma and I did a recce of the Milcote to Stratford-on-Avon canal section on a sunny afternoon, to check the link up.

The day dawned with a 6am alarm, on opening the curtains our hearts sank, strong winds and heavy rain overnight, several roads flooded and the footbridge by us was completely underwater! A text from Deb, saying I don't think we should be doing this....Ummm, quite a dilemma, you psych yourself up to complete the task, but think are we crazy? At 7am we met in Debbie's kitchen, filled our tums with porridge and sausages, and decided we'd give it a go!

About three miles along our route, we were met by water right across the pathway and no escape, but to wade through filling boots, socks etc. Not the best start when you still have 23

miles to go! We got to Stratford-on-Avon and saw the extent of the flooding there, had a quick toilet stop and headed on our way. Rebecca met us for a quick photo call heading out of Stratford-on-Avon on the canal and compared flooding notes, blisters, etc. It was a welcome boost to our efforts and spurred us on our way.

Wilmcote was our next stop for a welcome mug of soup and a sugar hit of chocolate (any excuse!) brought along by Emma's husband Ian. As Emma had the Marathon app we were told we still weren't half way... on we plodded until Paula Ratcliffe announced we were at London Bridge and half way, which for us was a tiny little bridge just outside Bearley. A quick change of wet clothing for dry, as the rain had finally stopped, we headed back, no stops, just wanting to get the job done!

Back through the flooded pathway (we thought it would have subsided) and back to the car parked at Meon Vale, 9 hours later!! We were 7.5 hours moving time but elated to have finished, not too many aches and pains and pleased that we had kept each other going as a team, we learnt new stories and completed our challenge.

Running is a fairly new sport to me; I started at the beginning of 2020 by joining some friends who were training for the 2020 London Marathon. I ran with them and completed a half marathon in March 2020. me, give me a wave and encourage me on. uk.virginmoneygiving.com/lindeyanderson5

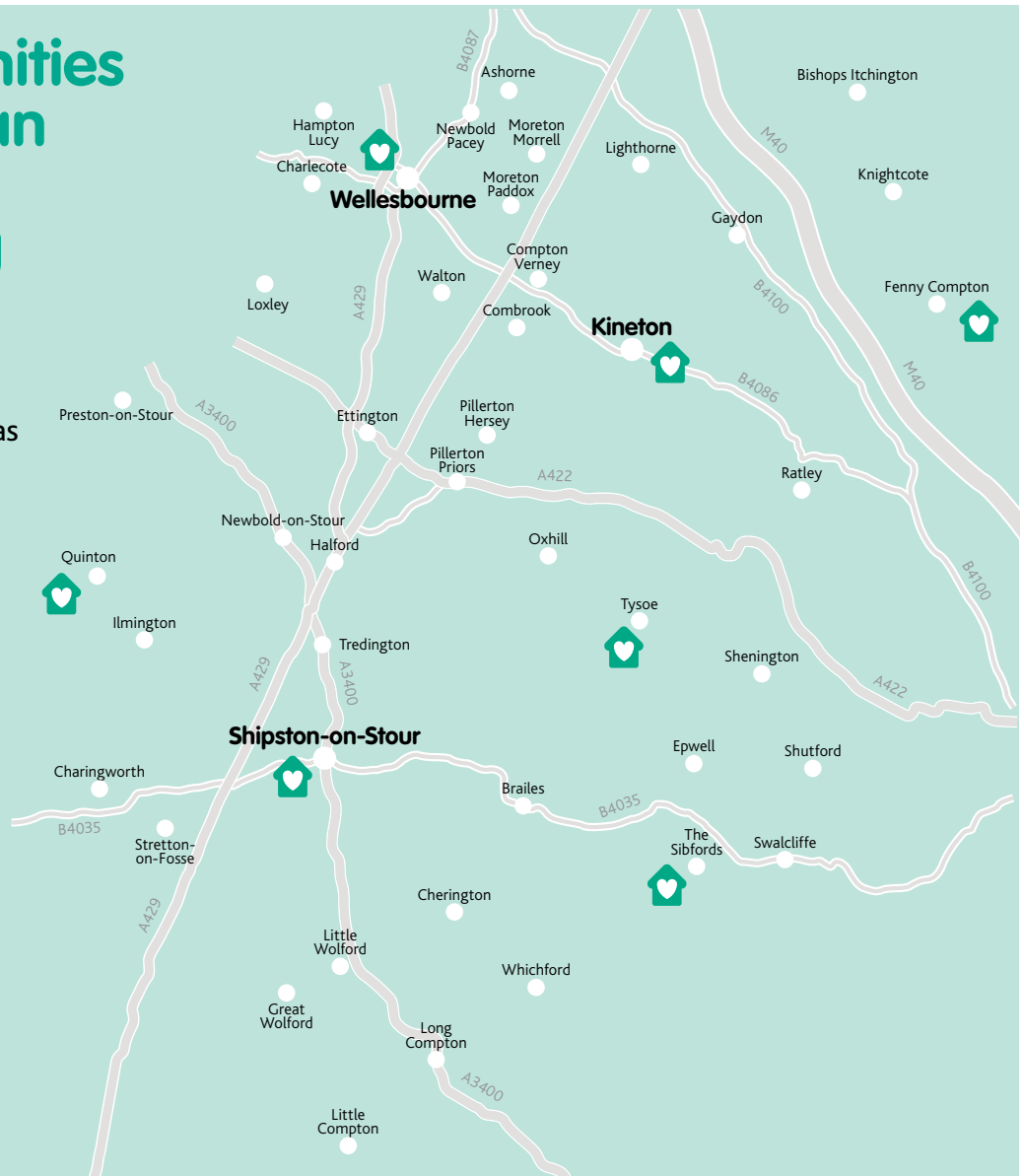
